

Michael's Musinas

We have four Gospels that tell us about Jesus. Mark and John do not include any stories of Jesus' birth. They go straight to his adult life. Matthew and Luke spend some time telling about Jesus' birth and Luke gives us a brief glimpse of a preteen Jesus. However, all the Gospels share about Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection. It is of course the resurrection of Jesus that we celebrate at Easter.

This year I am drawn to Mark's version of Easter. I like the way Mark starts out, "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." Mark gets right to the point about Jesus – it is good news for us to hear and embrace.

Life can be disappointing at times. We may lose a job. A relationship with someone may be broken. Our health is not what it should be. I am sure there are more things out there that could be disappointing or even hurtful in our lives. Jesus encountered people like you and me who were hurting. He brought healing to their lives. That is what the good news of Jesus Christ means. God gives us His Son so that the world could experience healing.

Even though some unruly crowds and leaders of the Roman occupation of Judea wanted to quash the good news they could not. God saw to that by giving life back to Jesus so that Jesus could rise from the dead and be vindicated. That is indeed the good news!

George Frederick Handel became interested in music even thought his father was trying to direct him to study law. He tried to study law but dropped out. He went to Hamburg and became second violinist in the Opera House there. Handel's life was full of ups and downs. He was either popular or he was not. By 1741 the attendance at his operatic concerts had diminished significantly and he stopped his performances in April.

It was in August of 1741 that he collaborated with Charles Jennens, Jr. for what would become *Messiah*. The verses provided by Jennens were so inspirational that Handel worked twenty-three days on his composition. I found out that there is a legend that a servant bringing food to Handel discovered tears coming down Handel's cheeks. Handel was working on the "Hallelujah Chorus."

From *Treasury of Easter Celebrations,* Janette Woolsey writes, "*Messiah* was performed first in Dublin, April 13, 1742. The notices sent out prior to the opening requested ladies not to wear hoops and

gentlemen to leave their swords at home. Evidently space was a premium, and hoops and swords took up too much room!"


Eventually *Messiah* went to London where King George II decided to attend the performance. At the climax of the "Hallelujah Chorus" the king decided to stand because the music infected his soul with joy. When a king stands no one may remain seated. That was the start of the tradition of standing during the "Hallelujah Chorus."

It was a labor of love for Handel to compose the *Messiah*. He wanted to share the joy of celebrating the resurrection of Jesus. Even though Handel was experiencing hard times he was still able to experience the resurrected Jesus. For me Easter is the joy of remembering and experiencing joy that God would bring us new life through Jesus and His resurrection. It is also a reminder that we too will experience our glorious resurrection after our deaths. That is good news too!

My hope is that you will have a blessed Easter celebration.

Brown Butterscotch Pie

- Difficulty: Easy
- Total Time: 1 hr 35 mins, plus 2 hrs cooling time

Makes: 1 (9-inch) pie, or 8 to 10 servings

Browning butter (as opposed to just melting it) is one of those simple adjustments that make the ordinary extraordinary. We changed the classic butterscotch pie by letting the butter and sugar cook longer to give the whole pie a toasty, nutty flavor that balances the sweetness of the caramel.

What to buy: You'll need parchment paper or aluminum foil and pie weights to line and weigh down the crust so that it doesn't puff up while cooking. If you don't have pie weights, just use some dried beans. Game plan: This pie can be made and refrigerated up to 1 day in advance.

Ingredients

- 1 pie shell (homemade or store)
- 1 vanilla bean, split lengthwise, seeds scraped and reserved and pod reserved (or 1 teaspoon vanilla extract)
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter (1/2 stick)
- 3/4 cup packed dark brown sugar
- 9 large egg yolks3 tablespoons cornstarch

Instructions

- 1. Heat the oven to 350°F and arrange a rack in the middle.
- Bake pie shell until the crust starts to set, about 15 minutes.Remove the pie weights and

parchment paper and continue to bake until the crust is dry and slightly brown, about 10 to 15 minutes more. Remove to a wire rack and set aside.

- 3. Combine the vanilla seeds and pod (or vanilla extract), milk, and cream in a small saucepan, bring to a simmer over medium-high heat. Remove from the heat.
- 4. Melt the butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add 1/2 cup of the brown sugar, stir to combine, and cook, stirring often, until the mixture bubbles and there is a toasted smell (the butter should be brown but not burnt), about 5 minutes. Carefully whisk in the hot milk mixture and remove the saucepan from the heat to cool slightly, about 5 minutes. Remove and discard the vanilla pod.
- 5. In a large bowl, whisk the remaining 1/4 cup of brown sugar, egg yolks, and cornstarch until well blended and the whisk leaves a trail when lifted out of the mixture, about 3 minutes. Scrape down the sides of the bowl with a rubber spatula.
- 6. While whisking constantly, slowly pour a third of the milk mixture into the egg yolk mixture and whisk until well combined. Add the egg mixture back to the remaining milk mixture and place the saucepan over medium-low heat. Cook, constantly scraping the bottom of the saucepan with a rubber spatula, until the mixture coats the back of a spoon, about 7 to 10 minutes; set aside.
- Pour the mixture into the pie crust and bake until the edges are set but the middle still jiggles



slightly, about 25 to 30 minutes.
Place the pie on a wire rack and let it cool completely, about 2 hours. Serve at room temperature or cold.

I mourn with you. For many reasons, Christ's disciples missed the real work God had in mind. It happens to us all. But then, SOMETHING HAPPENED! Jesus defeated death! The Holy Spirit infused confused followers with new hope. And because St. Matthew is Jesus' bride, I'm pretty sure the same will happen here!

So when you meet on the Lord's Day; or help with Decades/Missions/Trustees/UMW/etc. and your back aches or you worry that there's just too much to do, remember that at the point when Christ's disciples felt all was lost - SOMETHING HAPPENED!

Alleuia! We heard this triumphant call from the angels over the stable at Bethlehem at Jesus' birth.. Easter also brings an even more resounding "Alleuia" as the angel at the empty tomb announces to the women who had come to find the body of Jesus, "He is risen!" What an amazing sequence of events that begins in a stable and ends with an empty tomb. God chose unlikely people to bring Jesus into the world - the inn keeper who promised to find a place for the young mother (with her husband at her side) to give birth and the angels who appeared to the shepherds that they should come to worship, "the new-born King". None of the characters in these events were important in the worldly sense, yet they responded with faith and courage. Just so at the horrifying events of the Crucifixion when it looks as though Jesus' ministry will come to a terrible end, and worse yet, that he has been betrayed by one of his disciples. Yet again God has provided the support to complete the circle that started in Bethlehem. Jesus' body is claimed by one of his followers, Joseph of Arimathea, someone whose involvement with Jesus enables him to risk asking for the body to give it proper burial. And the women who came on the day after the Sabbath to prepare the body with spices are endangering themselves as well as the body has been guarded. Again the angels prepare the world to hear the wonderful news of God's love - that even death has been conquered. This is fulfillment of the message of Isaiah, "the ransomed of Jehovah shall return, and come singing unto Zion ...they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away." All these centuries later, we marvel at the Easter message, the promise that death has been overcome and that the Holy Spirit will always be with us, regardless of who we have been or what we have done up the point of our acceptance of God's love and the promise of salvation. But that acceptance comes with a call to share the good news with others, and we all have a part to play in that process. Our belief is demonstrated in our reflection of the love of Jesus -"and they will know we are Christians by our love". Alleuia! Christ is risen!
